SUBJECT:	RECOGNIZING GRAHAM POLICE OFFICERS THAT DEPLOYED TO WESTERN NC IN THE AFTERMATH OF HURRICANE HELENE

Graham Police Department is requesting City Council to recognize the Graham Police Officers that deployed to Western North Carolina in the aftermath of Hurricane Helene to assist fellow police departments and emergency management in communities destroyed by the storm.

### **BACKGROUND/SUMMARY:**

On September 26, 2024, a Category 4 hurricane made landfall in Florida and proceeded northward, arriving in North Carolina on Thursday, September 27, 2024. The hurricane caused catastrophic loss and unprecedented damage across approximately 27 counties in Western North Carolina. On Sunday, September 29, 2024, the Graham Police Department was requested for deployment through a mutual aid request from Asheville Police Department. In response, Chief Baker contacted Lt. Barnes and the COP Team. All members of the unit were available and eager to be of assistance. However, one couldn't deploy due to other assigned duties. The 6 officers departed on Monday, September 30, 2024.

Upon arrival, officers ran into an issue with secure lodging and were re-routed to a hotel with no power and no water. They continued to live in these conditions while being assigned to several duties in Asheville. Until they departed on Friday, October 4, 2024, they performed many different tasks. They worked 16 hour shifts every day. They conducted downtown foot patrols during the day and night patrols on certain streets to assist business owners and displaced citizens. They manned barricades to keep motorists from dangerous areas and to keep traffic away from search and rescue personnel. They provided security to prevent looting at food and fuel distribution sites. While performing their duties they also had to figure out how to obtain meals because they did not always have access to meals at the emergency shelters/ facilities in the area.

Prior to their return, the NC Association of Chiefs of Police became the liaisons for law enforcement support to western NC. They managed requests and deployed personnel. We sent another 4 officers to Hendersonville NC on Sunday, October 6, 2024. They performed basic patrol duties day and night shifts, to give local officers a break until October 7. Then on October 8, they were re-deployed to Woodfin, NC to perform the same duties. They returned home on October 10, 2024.

On October 13, 2024 we sent 4 more officers to the Buncombe County Emergency Management Headquarters, that was located in an Embassy Suites there. They were originally housed in FEMA emergency shelters until being relocated to the hotel with access to both power and water. They were tasked with providing security at the headquarters because of threats received by them, both day and night. The headquarters for EM was primarily staffed by civilians at the time. They returned home on Thursday October 17, 2024.

These deployments were a hardship on our officers, their families and our agency. However, we were proud of the fact that when asking for volunteers to populate a list for deployments following the first one, the majority of our officers were eager to volunteer. We received positive feedback concerning their professionalism, dedication and willingness to work hard in less than desirable conditions to assist those suffering in a disaster area.

Staff recommends that Council formally recognize the 14 Graham Police Officers who deployed to Western North Carolina in response to the devastation caused by the hurricane. Their selfless efforts, unwavering commitment, dedication to duty and willingness to assist impacted communities, even while being away from their families for several days at a time, bring great credit upon them, their units, this department and the City of Graham. SUBJECT:	RECOGNIZING GRAHAM FIREFIGHTERS THAT DEPLOYED TO WESTERN NC IN THE AFTERMATH OF HURRICANE HELENE

Fire Chief is requesting City Council to recognize the Graham Firefighters that deployed to Western North Carolina in the aftermath of Hurricane Helene to assist fire departments devasted and destroyed by the storm.

### **BACKGROUND/SUMMARY:**

On September 26, 2024, a Category 4 hurricane made landfall in Florida and proceeded northward, arriving in North Carolina on Thursday, September 27, 2024. The hurricane caused catastrophic loss and unprecedented damage across approximately 27 counties in Western North Carolina. On Saturday, September 28, 2024, the Graham Fire Department was requested for deployment by the North Carolina Office of the State Fire Marshal. In response, a Graham Fire Engine with four personnel departed Graham around noon, reaching the Swannanoa community in Buncombe County by late afternoon.

Upon arrival, Graham Fire was initially stationed in Swannanoa. The following day, we were reassigned to the West Buncombe Fire Department and subsequently, the Fairview Fire Department. Our personnel remained at Fairview Fire Department until the completion of our mission on Thursday, October 24, 2024. Over the 27-day deployment, twelve Graham Firefighters rotated in to complete seven missions, each lasting between three to five days.

This deployment was marked by significant challenges, including the tragic Line of Duty Death of Battalion Chief Tony Garrison of Fairview Fire Department. Chief Garrison was killed on September 27, 2024, in a mudslide while attempting a civilian rescue, underscoring the extreme conditions first responders faced throughout the recovery efforts.

This deployment reflects the dedication and resilience of the Graham Fire Department in response to statewide emergencies and demonstrates our commitment to supporting communities in crisis.

Staff recommends that Council formally recognize the Graham Firefighters who deployed to Western North Carolina in response to the devastation caused by the hurricane. Mayor Talley asked for Item f, an amendment to the Graham Historical Museum Advisory Board bylaws, to be removed for discussion.

Mayor Pro Tem Hall motioned to approve Consent Agenda items a through e, seconded by Council Member Chin. The motion passed unanimously.

<u>Item f</u>: Mayor Talley stated she would like the Council to consider one member from Graham's ETJ and one outside the City.

Motion by Mayor Talley to allow one member from Graham's ETJ and one from outside the City to serve on the Graham Historical Museum Advisory Board, seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Hall. The motion passed unanimously.

### **PUBLIC HEARINGS:**

1. <u>ANNEXATION – 0.79 ACRE – Off JIMMIE KERR ROAD - AN2403 – CONTINUED FROM SEPTEMBER 10, 2024, MEETING</u>

A public hearing was continued to consider an Annexation Ordinance to extend the corporate limits to the City of Graham for two tracts of land totaling 0.79 acre located off Jimmie Kerr Road. (Continued from the September 10, 2024, Council meeting.)

Assistant City Manager Aaron Holland stated the petition was a request for the Council's approval to extend the corporate limits to include the subject properties. The area being considered for annexation is located off of Jimmie Kerr Road and contains approximately 0.79 +- acre total. Water is located along the frontage of this property within the Jimmie Kerr Road right of way, and the applicant requested to connect to the City's water infrastructure. He stated that some of the property was already in the City and zoned B-2.

Councilmember Whitaker brought to everyone's attention that this item had been heard twice by the Planning Board.

Assistant City Manager Holland stated the annexation was not heard because it does not go through the Planning Board, but the Planning Board tabled the rezoning and recommended denial.

Councilmember Whitaker asked if the rezoning was denied because the applicant did not attend the Planning Board meeting.

Assistant City Manager Holland stated that was correct. Mr. Holland said there was some confusion with the date of the meeting given to the applicant.

The public hearing was opened and the following spoke:

Ms. Shannon Donahoe, 759 Jimmie Kerr Road, Haw River, stated she was not aware she needed to attend the meeting and was only told by staff to complete the paperwork. She said for the second meeting she was informed that she needed to be present but was emailed the incorrect day.

Mayor Talley asked Ms. Donahoe if she knew the zoning around her was B-2 and if she was okay with that rezoning.

Ms. Donahoe stated she was okay with B-2 zoning.

The Public Hearing was closed.

Motion by Mayor Pro Tem Hall to close the public hearing seconded by Council Member Chin. The motion passed unanimously.

Motion by Mayor Pro Tem Hall to approve the annexation ordinance to extend the corporate limits to the City of Graham for two tracts of land totaling 0.79 acre located off Jimmie Kerr Road, second by Council Member Chin. The motion passed unanimously.

### 2. REZONING – JIMMIE KERR ROAD – UN-ZONED TO B-2 GENERAL BUSINESS

City Council considered a rezoning from un-zoned to B-2, General Business for two tracts of land totaling 0.79 acre located off Jimmie Kerr Road.

The public hearing was opened and no one spoke.

Motion by Mayor Pro Tem Hall to close the public hearing seconded by Council Member Parsons. The motion passed unanimously.

Motion by Council Member Chin to approve the rezoning to B-2, General Business, for two tracts of land totaling 0.79 acre located off Jimmie Kerr Road and the rezoning is consistent with Graham's 2035 Comprehensive Plan and consistent with the current land zoning and land use plan for the overall goal of establishing water to the residence, seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Hall. The motion passed unanimously.

# 3. <u>AMENDMENT – DEVELOPMENT ORDINANCE – DISTANCE OF RECREATIONAL OPEN SPACE</u>

City Council considered approval of an Ordinance amending Article 4, Division 12, Section 10.249, Open Space Provisions for R-12, R-15, and R-18 Zoning Districts in the Development Ordinance adding location requirements for Recreation Open Space.

Assistant City Manager Holland stated the Council had asked staff to revisit the recently approved open space language and include a requirement of distance from dwellings where the recreational open space needs to be located. He shared staff had provided an update that 90% of homes must be within a 1/4 mile (1,320 feet) of a recreational open space area. He stated the Planning Board reviewed the amendment and recommended approval but with the change, the distance should be lessened from 1/4 of a mile to 1/8 of a mile (660 feet).

Council asked to see what this would look like to determine if this was something they wanted to revise.

Assistant City Manager Holland stated he would bring back a visual example of how the Council could perceive recreational spaces within a division.

Motion by Council Member to table this item to the November 12, 2024, Council meeting to review examples of recreational open spaces, second by Mayor Pro Tem Hall. The motion passed unanimously.

### **OLD BUSINESS:**

### 4. PEDESTRIAN PLAN UPDATE DISCUSSION

City Council will discuss the proposed City of Graham Pedestrian Plan Update. (Continued from the September 10, 2024, Council meeting.)

Mayor Talley stated she had shared questions with Assistant City Manager Holland. She stated the plan contained information regarding roundabouts that she did not think was consistent with the Downtown Master Plan, regarding roundabouts that were taken out of the Downtown Plan. She began addressing other issues and Assistant City Manager Holland suggested that it would be better to sit down and review all her concerns so he could explain the updates.

Assistant City Manager Holland asked if other Council Members had any concerns to forward them by email.

Motion by Mayor Talley to table this item to the November 12, 2024, Council meeting, seconded by Council Member Whitaker. The motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Keith Westbrooks inquired about a grant for Elm Street sidewalks.

The Council replied there were no grants for sidewalks on Elm Street.

### **NEW BUSINESS:**

# 5. <u>AMENDMENT – ORDINANCE – ENCROACHMENTS UPON STREETS, SIDEWALKS, AND</u> OTHER PUBLIC PLACES

City Council will consider an Ordinance amendment to Chapter 18 - Streets, Sidewalks, and Other Public Places, Article 1 - In General, Sections 18-2 and 18-6 of the Code of Ordinances.

Assistant City Holland stated City staff had received recent inquiries about utilizing space within City parking lots for dumpsters. Current ordinances do not allow encroachments within this space, and staff brought this to the attention of the Council after the September 10, 2024, meeting. He stated the City Council directed staff to bring forward an ordinance addressing the request at the upcoming October 8, 2024, meeting. The following amendment to the Code of Ordinances adds "City Parking Lots" as an area Council may approve for permissive use.

Mayor Talley stated that sharing a dumpster with three or four businesses was better than having 20 trash cans on the sidewalks.

Motion by Mayor Pro Tem Hall to approve the Ordinance amendment to Chapter 18, Streets, Sidewalks, and Other Public Places, Article 1, Section 18-2 and 18-6 of the Code of Ordinances, seconded by Council Member Chin. The motion passed unanimously.

### **PUBLIC COMMENT:**

There were no public comments.

### **STAFF COMMENTS:**

Assistant City Manager Holland stated City Staff had received a request from the Valleyfield Homeowners Association to evaluate no parking perimeters from the entrance of Valleyfield to where the no parking currently starts. He asked for consensus from the Council to allow staff to review and report to the Council.

Mayor Talley asked the City Attorney if Council Member Whitaker and Mayor Pro Tem Hall needed to recuse themselves when considering this concern because they reside in the Valleyfield division.

City Attorney Ward stated he would look into it and advise.

Council consensus was to have staff evaluate the parking concerns in Valleyfield.

### **COUNCIL COMMENTS:**

Mayor Talley:

- Excited about the \$500,000 grant to conduct the PSAF study.
- She received in the mail a \$119,437 grant from the Accessible Park Grant Program for Graham Recreation for the ADA updates.
- Visited and spoke to Alamance Christian School students and received wonderful thank you letters.
- Thanked individuals and businesses who had reached out to help our neighbors in Western Carolina.
- Fire Chief Cole gave an update regarding the teams deployed to assist Western Carolina due to Hurricane Helene.

### Council Member Chin:

- The third Saturday of October would be the last ALCOVET concert and car show.
- November 9<sup>th</sup> Veterans Day Parade followed by ALCOVET's festival.
- ALCOVETS delivered supplies to Western Carolina.

SUBJECT:	STATE FORFEITURE FUND BUDGET AMENDMENT 2024-2025
PREPARED BY:	SERGEANT B.T. EDWARDS

The Graham Police Department requests Council approved a budget amendment in the amount of \$1,400 in state drug forfeiture revenue to the state account balance for use.

### **BACKGROUND/SUMMARY:**

The Graham Police Department participates in the Department of Justice Asset Forfeiture Program. This program "is a nationwide law enforcement initiative that removes the tools of crime from criminal organizations, deprives wrongdoers of the proceeds of their crimes, recovers property that may be used to compensate victims, and deters crime" (DOJ, 2009). "One of the ancillary benefits of asset forfeiture is the potential to share federal forfeiture proceeds with cooperating state and local law enforcement agencies through equitable sharing" (DOJ, 2018). Being one of the recipient agencies, the Police Department receives these funds as we participate in certain investigations.

To use these funds, as directed by NCGS 159-8 contained in the Local Government Budget and Fiscal Control Act, the law enforcement agency's governing body must authorize the transfer of these revenue funds to a required, separate, budgeted account for its use. The use of these funds rest with the law enforcement agency head. Equitably shared funds shall be used by law enforcement agencies for law enforcement purposes only to add to the department's budget, not supplement.

The Police Department is requesting a budget amendment on behalf of Chief MK Baker for the use of these funds. This request is in compliance with the rules and regulations for the use of forfeiture funds under Federal guidelines.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** There is no cost to the City of Graham as transferred funds come from the equitable sharing program. The funds to be transferred to the state drug fund budget total \$1,400.

SUBJECT:	PURCHASE OF TEER PROPERTY ADJACENT TO BILL COOKE PARK
PREPARED BY:	BRIAN FAUCETTE, DIRECTOR OF RECREATION AND PARKS

Approve a budget amendment of \$595,000 for the purchase of three parcels totaling 12.056 acres adjacent to Bill Cooke Park from the Teer Family.

### **BACKGROUND/SUMMARY:**

At the July 9, 2024 meeting, City Council approved the purchase of three parcels (#147644, #147738, and #147739) owned by Susan Teer Lambert and Cathy Teer Evans for the expansion of Bill Cooke Park in the amount of \$615,000. Council also approved a budget amendment for earnest money in the amount of \$20,000 at the July 9<sup>th</sup> meeting, leaving a balance of \$595,000.

With the approval of the purchase, GRPD staff began working on a Waiver of Retroactivity from the NC Division of Parks and Recreation for the Parks and Recreation Trust Fund (PARTF) Grant. The Waiver of Retroactivity was received on August 12, 2024 and will allow the City of Graham to purchase the property before applying for a PARTF Grant that could reimburse the City up to 50% of the purchase price. An application for a PARTF Grant will be submitted by May 1, 2025.

### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

Expenditures expected are for the purchase of the property in the amount of \$615,000. If the City is awarded a PARTF Grant for reimbursement of the purchase, the City could receive a maximum of \$307,500.

In May of 2017 NC DOT, Burlington and Graham executed a municipal agreement to provide a system-wide upgrade of thirty-year-old technology, software, hardware and infrastructure for signalized intersections. The following City of Graham intersections were included; Marshall Street and Elm Street, Pine Street and Marshall Street, Pine Street and Melville Street and Marshall Street and Albright Avenue at a cost of \$40,538.69 per intersection.

The \$162,155.00 will increase the expenditures 10-5500-7400 Capital outlay equipment and fund balance appropriation revenue.

Thank you for meeting with us on October 2, 2024, to discuss the recently completed NCDOT Traffic Signal Upgrade project. As you know this project included traffic signals and equipment in Burlington and four signals in Graham. The City of Burlington has a Traffic Signal Maintenance and Operations Agreement with the City of Graham for \$24,000.00 annually. This is invoiced quarterly (\$6,000 per quarter) to maintain these four signalized intersections in Graham that include:

Signal Inventory Number	<u>Intersection</u>
G0100	Marshall Street and Elm Street
G0101	Pine Street and Marshall Street
G0102	Pine Street and Melville Street
G0103	Marshall Street and Albright Avenue

The North Carolina Department of Transportation, in partnership with the City of Burlington, executed a municipal agreement (May 2017) to provide a system wide upgrade to thirty-year-old technology software, hardware, and infrastructure.

The preliminary NCDOT estimate for upgrading the four traffic signals was \$250,641.00 (\$62,600.00 per signal). Based on the project's final cost, which was less than the original estimate, the cost for upgrading the four City of Graham traffic signals is \$162,154.77 (\$40,538.69 per signal). With this upgrade, the City of Graham has state-of-the-art traffic signal infrastructure, hardware, and software installed, maintained, and monitored by experienced City of Burlington Traffic Operations and Maintenance Staff.

As discussed during our meeting, the Burlington's Finance Department will prepare an invoice to the City of Graham for the total amount (\$162,154.77), which can be paid as a lump sum or in installments. We appreciate the partnership with this project to provide safe and efficient traffic operations for the public. Please let me know if you have any questions or need additional information.

### **REQUESTED ACTION:**

Approve the project budget for the Recreation Center's Accessible Parks Grant Improvements Project.

### **BACKGROUND/SUMMARY:**

At the April 9, 2024 meeting, City Council authorized staff to apply for the 2024 Accessible Parks Grant for projects at the Graham Recreation Center. This project will accomplish the following:

- 1) ADA Entryway Doors The exterior doors will be upgraded to include ADA-compliant push plate door opening mechanisms. To date, all entryway doors require someone to pull the door open to enter. The new system will allow all users to independently enter the Center by: a) pulling the door open to enter or b) pushing a button outside the building to activate the automatic door opening mechanism. A similar button will be installed on the interior of the Center to activate the door for exiting.
- 2) ADA/Family Restroom A new restroom unit will be created to meet all ADA standards and be labeled a "Family" restroom. To date, there are no ADA-accessible restroom units in the Center. This project will reduce the overall number of restroom units in the Center from eight (4 in each restroom) to seven (3 in each traditional restroom and one ADA/family restroom unit). This reduction has been approved by the City's Inspections Director.

Given this project is likely to extend more than one fiscal year, the funds are being requested to be converted to a capital project to preserve the funding necessary for completion.

### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

Total project cost is estimated at \$143,325. City Council approved a budget amendment for the local match of up to \$26,250 on September 10, 2024. If the project is completed within the estimated budget, the City's local match will be reduced to \$23,888.

Approval.

We have been fortunate to receive access to a shipment of meters that will allow us to continue with our replacement efforts while also providing the needed meters for new development.

### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

Collection of water and sewer charges are ahead of expectation and has afforded us the opportunity to provide necessary funds.

### **BACKGROUND/SUMMARY:**

As part of their commitment to Alamance County and continuing the presence of public art, Alamance Arts has presented Kaleidoscope sculptures to local municipalities in honor of Cary Worthy, retired Executive Director of Alamance Arts. The funding is provided by donations made in recognition and celebration of his 25+ years of service to the arts in Alamance County. Currently, three Kaleidoscope sculptures have been placed – one each in the City of Burlington, Town of Elon, and City of Mebane.

The proposed sculpture is a large Atomic Kaleidoscope with three scopes to be placed at Graham Regional Park (photo attached). Mr. Anderson's sculptures have been observed as "an interactive living sculpture" and are present in a large number of public spaces throughout the country. (https://rcandersondoorcounty.com/)

Details of the proposed Kaleidoscope sculpture:

- Three viewing stations, each containing a brass kaleidoscope mounted at different levels to accommodate people of different statures as well as people using a wheelchair
- A rotating center bowl with a drain through the center pedestal
- Powder coated steel, in a "copper vein" finish
- 54" H x 46" W (approximate measurements)
- The entire sculpture is designed to be displayed outside all year

The GRPD Parks Maintenance Division has prepared a site at Graham Regional Park that could accept the sculpture.

### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

The GRPD Parks Maintenance Division will install the sculpture, which requires pouring a concrete pad with approximate dimensions of 32" (square or round) and 5"- 6" deep. The surrounding landscape will also be enhanced. Expenses will be incorporated into the general Grounds Maintenance budget of the Parks Maintenance Division.

### **STAFF RECOMMENDATION:**



### **Summary**

This is a request to rezone 4.7 acres of property from I-1(Light-Industrial) and R-G (General Residential) to C-R (Conditional Residential) for the purpose of construct around 53 town homes. The site plans to connect public roadways, water, and sewer through the existing utilities surrounding the property. The sewer connection will have to be acquired via easement that the TRC has asked to list on the plans as required prior to acceptance of TRC approval. The property is fully inside of the Industrial/Warehousing future land use zone. The future land use plan mentions nothing about residential uses inside of them and suggests the area should be made up of large one and two story industrial buildings with easy access to I-85 and I-40. The Site falls under the 5 acre threshold for requiring open space, but it has been provided. All lots will have two driveway parking spaces and 1 garage parking space. The project does meet the R-MF density requirement listed in Section 10.245 of the City of Graham Development Ordinance. The developers have requested conditions to reduce the exterior setback from 25 feet to 15 feet, minus the front driveway entrance lot lines, a reduction in the planting yard widths from a 15 foot type B buffer to a 10 foot type D buffer, and lastly a reduction in the required distance between buildings from 25 feet to 12 feet. Planning Board recommended denial of the project at a unanimous vote of 5-0.


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

### Conformity to the Graham 2035 Comprehensive Plan (GCP) and Other Adopted Plans

Future Land Use Industrial/Warehousing Desired Pattern: Industrial districts should have limited setbacks between the front of the property line and between adjacent industrial uses in order to use land and infrastructure efficiently. These uses should be heavily buffered from residential neighborhoods, parks and open space, and streams. Such areas should follow orderly development patterns and seek to maintain minimal adverse environmental impacts.

### **Applicable Policies:**

- Policy 5.1.1 Housing Variety. Encourage a mix of housing types within Graham to increase choice. These can include single family dwellings units, multifamily dwelling units, small units, pre-fabricated homes, co-housing and clustered housing. This project would construct additional high-density housing.
- Policy 3.3.2: Focused development. In order to maintain Graham's affordability and promote growth, the City will facilitate smart growth development by promoting infill development and focused, walkable, and mixed use, built environments.
- Strategy 4.3.1 Land Use Patterns. Promote development of efficient land use patterns to allow continued quality and efficiency of water systems. Discourage the extension of water service into areas that are not most suitable for development. The site would connect to existing city infrastructure, with redundant access and water and sewer connections and could be extended through future roadway connections if developed.

# Planning Type Neighborhoods

### <u>Development Type</u> Industrial/ Warehousing

Industrial districts contain large one and two story buildings with easy access to the major roads like state highways and Interstate 40/85 for heavy freight vehicles. Some of these uses may be considered noxious and therefore adequate buffers must exist between industrial uses and other land uses, as well as natural areas. Graham's wastewater treatment plant is also located in an industrial area.





SUBJECT:	RECREATIONAL OPEN SPACE LOCATION
PREPARED BY:	CAMERON WEST, PLANNER

#### **REQUESTED ACTION:**

Amend Development Ordinance to include a requirement for distance recreational open space needs to be from dwellings.

#### **BACKGROUND/SUMMARY:**

Council has asked staff to revisit the recently approved open space language and include a requirement of distance from dwellings the recreational open space needs to be located. Staff has provided the update that 90% of dwellings must be within a 1/4 mile (1320 feet) of a recreational open space area. Planning Board reviewed the amendment at their most recent meeting and recommended approval of the amendment with the change that the distance be lessened from 1/4 of a mile to 1/8 of a mile (660 feet). All voted in favor of the recommendation.

#### **STAFF RECOMMENDATION:**

Approval

#### **SUGGESTED MOTION(S):**

I move to approve the Ordinance amendment to Article 4, Division 12, Section 10.249. Open Space Provisions for R-12, R-15, and R-18 Zoning Districts in the Development Ordinance to add location requirements for Recreational Open Space.

#### Section 10.249.5 Open Space Criteria

- (a) In selecting land to be set aside as open space the developer shall choose areas from the following categories in descending order of importance before designating other land for open space use.
  - (1) Designated buffer areas together with any floodway and floodplain they are buffering.
  - (2) Land within 30 feet of other bodies of water or watercourses.
  - (3) Other flood hazard areas or land with slopes greater than 15%.
  - (4) Other hazard areas or environmentally sensitive areas such as noise and privacy buffers for surrounding properties and neighborhoods.
  - (5) Lands that will protect important view sheds and/or trees along existing roads and provide privacy for the development.
  - (6) Other areas within the proposed development.
- (b) Under no circumstances may a right-of-way, easement (excluding those for public purposes), setback requirement, or a portion of a subdivided lot be considered as part of the open space requirement.
- (c) Open space areas shall be legally and easily accessible to the residents of the development from which the required open space is taken.
- (d) Recreational Open Space as defined in Section 10.249.4(f) shall not be less than 50 feet in the shortest dimension with the exception of walking trails.
- (e) In open space subdivisions which require recreational open space, as defined by Section 10.249.4 (f), 90% of lots must be located within one-quarter (1/4) mile (or 1,320 feet) of a recreational open space area. This distance will be measured in linear feet on a right-of-way that leads from a lot to a recreational open space area.

#### Section 10.249.6 Uses or Activities Permitted in Open Space Areas

- (1) Conservation of land in its natural state (for example, woodland, fallow field or managed meadow).
- (2) Agricultural uses, including raising of crops or livestock.
- (3) Passive recreation, including but not limited to trails, picnic areas, community gardens and lawn areas.
- (4) Active recreation areas such as golf courses, swimming areas, playing fields, playgrounds, courts and associated parking. These areas shall be designed to enhance the required open space area.
- (5) Pasture for recreational horses.
- (6) Easements for drainage, access (i.e. greenways, bike trails, etc.), sewer or water lines, or other public purposes.

#### **REQUESTED ACTION:**

Select a firm to complete a Master Plan for Graham Regional Park and approve a corresponding budget amendment.

#### **BACKGROUND/SUMMARY:**

At the Council's budget planning session on December 18, 2023, several Key Strategic Actions were identified. One goal is to "explore options to build a sports complex/multi-use complex". To advance this goal, GRPD staff requested proposals for completion of a Master Plan of Graham Regional Park.

Three firms submitted proposals for completing a Master Plan:

Benesch –	\$45,000 - \$55,000 - Fee Range - range is based on # of on-site visits needed for Community Input and presentations
Bolton & Menk –	\$20,000 – Project Coordination and Project Management \$20,000 – Data Collection and Site Assessment
	\$50,000 – Conceptual Park Plan, Draft Alternatives, and Graham Regional Park Master Plan
	\$90,000 – Total Project Budget
Withers Ravenel –	\$22,000 – Site Inventory & Analysis
	\$26,000 – Recreational Needs Assessment
	\$28,000 – Concept Plan Alternatives
	\$23,000 – Draft Master Plan
	\$16,000 – Final Master Plan
	\$115,000 – Total

Proposals were reviewed by GRPD staff and were presented to the Graham Recreation Commission without fee proposals attached so each submission could be assessed based on merit. After review, the Recreation Commission recommends consideration of WithersRavenel (1A) and Benesch (1B) to complete a Master Plan.

Comments made in favor of the proposals from WithersRavenel and Benesch include:

- 1A) WithersRavenel up to 3 park concepts will be presented with opinion of probable construction cost, robust/lengthy community engagement plan, "vigorous" exploration of creative design, young staff members to relate to young members of our community, staff familiar with City of Graham operations
- 1B) Benesch familiarity with the City (recently completed Lake Master Plan), specific/relatable language in the proposal, identifies a need for accessibility

#### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

The Master Plan was not included in the general budget passed by Council in June. A budget amendment will be required to fund this project for FY 2024-2025.

#### **STAFF RECOMMENDATION:**

Considering the recommendation of the Graham Recreation Commission of contracting with WithersRavenel (#1A) or Benesch (#1B) and considering the financial differences of the two proposals, staff recommends contracting with Benesch to complete the Graham Regional Park Master Plan.

#### **SUGGESTED MOTION(S):**

Make a motion to select Benesch as the vendor for the Graham Regional Park Master Plan and approve a budget amendment not to exceed \$55,000.

### STAFF REPORT

SUBJECT:	2024 PEDESTRIAN PLAN UPDATE

#### **REQUESTED ACTION:**

Approve City of Graham Pedestrian Plan Update.

#### **BACKGROUND/SUMMARY:**

With the approval to proceed by City Council in 2023, the City of Graham and the NCDOT Integrated Mobility Division (IMD) proceeded with an update to the existing Graham Pedestrian Plan. The current plan was adopted in 2006 with several areas needing to be revised due to the growth of the city in areas not currently highlighted in the exisiting plan. With consideration to the steering committee and public engageent input, recommendations were carefully integrated into the plan. Recommendations include prioritized implementation and funding strategies supporting near-term (within five years) to long-range projects, facility standards, and a cohesive vision to improve safety, comfort, and promote economic development.



In addition to supporting multimodal, Complete Streets, and community goals, the plan also looks to comply with IMD Bicycle and Pedestrian Planning Grant Initiative. The plan focuses on potential improvements, with special focus on safe crossings and connecting the City's new growth with pedestrian and multi-use path facilities.

# **Executive Summary**



This executive summary provides a brief overview of the City of Graham Pedestrian Plan and key recommendations.

#### **About This Plan**

The City of Graham Pedestrian Plan ("the Plan") provides guidance for the City, North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT), Alamance County, Burlington-Graham Metropolitan Planning Organization (BGMPO), and other stakeholders in developing improvements to the City of Graham pedestrian infrastructure, programs, and policies.

The Plan was developed through extensive public outreach, review of existing conditions, coordination with a dedicated Steering Committee, and consideration of the City's vision and goals. Graham seeks to become a more pedestrian friendly City that encourages the choice to walk, advance the community's mobility and quality of life, and improve pedestrian connectivity to key destinations for residents and visitors of all ages and abilities. During the planning process, Graham residents and stakeholders voiced their concerns and hopes for walking throughout the City and to other destinations in Alamance County.

The Plan is primarily focused on infrastructure improvements in support of walking, improving crossings at roadways, and building out and connecting to a regional greenway network. The benefits of walking and recommended policies and programs to support active transportation are reviewed as part of the Plan appendices.

### **Priority Recommendations (Top Eight Combined Projects)**

The Plan identified a total of eight priority project bundles (made up of 30 individual projects – including 13 linear pedestrian projects and 17 intersection-related projects) to improve walking in Graham. These projects were selected through a process that began with identifying the City's vision and goals, mapping priority and secondary corridors, and creating projects to match the City's mobility and safety needs. Finally, all recommended projects were ranked according to criteria developed with the City and Steering Committee that prioritized connections to key destinations, extending the existing pedestrian network, safety, equitable pedestrian access, recreation, and cost effectiveness. The top 8 projects are as described in Table I-1 and illustrated in the map in Figure I-1.
